

Foxconned: Imaginary Jobs, Bulldozed Homes and the Sacking of Local Government

Nationally recognized journalist Lawrence

Tabak, author of Foxconned: Imaginary Jobs, Bulldozed Homes, and the Sacking of Local Government will provide the keynote presentation on Friday, November 4 followed by a discussion with UWM-Waukesha History Professor Jonathon Kasparek. Tabak and Kasparek will also participate in a panel discussion of his book, Saturday, November 5, at 12:15 pm in N133. Joining them in the discussion are UWM-Waukesha political science professors Margaret Hankenson and Dylan Bennet, and philosophy professor Tim Dunn.

Powerful and resonant, *Foxconned* is both the definitive autopsy of the Foxconn fiasco and a dire warning to communities and states nationwide.

When Wisconsin governor Scott Walker stood shoulder to shoulder with President Trump and Speaker of the House Paul Ryan at the White House in July 2017, they painted a glorious picture of his state's future. Foxconn, the enormous Chinabased electronics firm, was promising to bring TV manufacturing back to the United States with a \$10 billion investment and 13,000 well-paying jobs. Two years later, the project was in shambles. Land had been seized, homes had been destroyed, and hundreds of millions of municipal dollars had been committed for just a few hundred jobs—nowhere near enough for Foxconn to earn the incentives Walker had shoveled at them. In *Foxconned*, journalist Lawrence Tabak details the full story of this inevitable collapse.

Tabak details every kind of financial chicanery, from eminent domain abuse to good old-fashioned looting—all to benefit a coterie of consultants, politicians, and contractors. With compassion and care, he also reports the distressing stories of the many individuals whose lives were upended by Foxconn.

Lawrence Tabak attended Northwestern University and the University of Iowa, from which he holds BA and MA degrees. His essays and articles have appeared in numerous publications including Salon, the millions, Fast Company, The Atlantic Monthly and The New York Times. His novel In Real Life was published in 2014 and his latest book, *Foxconned*, was published in 2021 by the University of Chicago Press. It received the best nonfiction book of the year award from the Council for Wisconsin Writers. A paperback edition from the University of Chicago Press is now available.

Twenty-four authors and four exhibitors are on hand in the Don Taylor Writers Marketplace to discuss and sell their books. The Southeast Wisconsin Festival of Books has renamed its Authors Marketplace to memorialize support given by the late Don Taylor. Originally begun as a person-to-person contact for selfpublished authors to sell their books, the Marketplace evolved into an online marketplace where authors and organizations could contact the reading public through the Festival of Books website when the Festival went virtual in 2020. The Festival will continue this on-line presence this year and once again offer personto-person sales. Taylor was the primary sponsor of the Writers Marketplace since it began in 2014. We thought this an appropriate recognition for someone who was so important to the success of the Festival," said Laraine O'Brien, Festival founder. A well-known banker and community leader, Taylor was also an author who had written several books of historical fiction set in Waukesha.

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
