## Bob Woodward is

America's preeminent journalistic watchdog protecting our democracy. He is an associate editor of The Washington Post, where he has worked since 1971. He has shared in two Pulitzer Prizes, first for the coverage of the Watergate scandal with Carl Bernstein, and second as the lead reporter for coverage of the $9 / 11$ terrorist attacks.

Woodward has written best-selling books on the last ten presidents-Nixon, Ford, Carter, Reagan, George H.W. Bush, Clinton, George W. Bush, Obama, Trump and Biden -as well as the CIA, the Joint Chiefs, Hollywood and the Supreme Court. His approach is aggressive but fair and nonpartisan reporting.

He has authored or coauthored 22 books, all of which have been national non-fiction bestsellers. Fifteen have been \#1 national bestsellers. Reading Woodward's body of work provides not only a history of the presidency for the past 50 years, but a record of other governmental institutions from the Supreme Court to the Department of Justice to the military and the Federal Reserve. His website, www.BobWoodward.com, provides a chronicle of his writing, audio and visual presentations and an invitation to a class he gives on investigative journalism.

Newsweek magazine has excerpted six of Woodward's books in headline-making cover stories. 60 Minutes has done pieces on eight of his books. Three of his books have been made into movies.

Woodward was born in Illinois and graduated from Yale University in 1965. He served five years as a communications officer in the Navy. After being discharged as a lieutenant in August, 1970, Woodward considered attending law school but applied for a job as a reporter for The Washington Post. Harry M. Rosenfeld, the Post's metropolitan editor, gave him a two-week trial, which he failed. After a year at the Montgomery Sentinel, a weekly in the Washington D.C. suburbs, Woodward was hired as a Post reporter in September, 1971.

## David Zucker, Jim Abrahams, and Jerry Zucker

knew one another growing up in Shorewood, Wisconsin. While attending the University of Wisconsin-Madison, the trio founded a small theater known as The Kentucky Fried Theater in 1971. They moved to Los Angeles in 1972, which led to their first film The Kentucky Fried Movie in 1977. ZAZ's next film was their breakout hit Airplane! in 1980, which remains a revered comedic milestone.

When Airplane! premiered on July 2nd, 1980, it changed the face of comedy. With a budget of $\$ 3.5$ million it became an instant smash and went on to make nearly $\$ 200$ million in sales. Generations of comedians and filmmakers have been influenced by this beloved film. Now, David Zucker, Jim Abrahams, and Jerry Zucker, the legendary trio (also known as ZAZ) who wrote and directed the film share the behind-the-scenes dish in Surely You Can't Be Serious: The True Story of Airplane! This firstever oral history is packed with anecdotes, trivia, and never-before-known factoids. The book is also filled with photos, movie stills, and personal pictures from the authors.

Airplane! is considered one of greatest comedy films ever made and was placed on the National Film Registry by the Library of Congress as being "culturally, historically, or aesthetically significant." Its many one-liners and visual gags have worked their way into mainstream culture. It began, however, as the brainchild of three guys from Wisconsin with a dream of making films that would make people laugh. Surely You Can't Be Serious takes readers back to ZAZ's humble beginnings, through each stage of the movie's production (and how they made a movie with three directors), and what happened after the movie premiered. Throughout, readers hear from the cast, crew, studio executives, and comedic greats Jimmy Kimmel, Bill Hader, "Weird Al" Yankovic, Sarah Silverman, and many more.

After "Airplane," the Zuckers and Abraham made an attempt at television with "Police Squad!" (ABC, 1982) before returning to the big screen with "Top Secret!" (1984). With the trio going their separate ways, Zucker began making more mainstream movies, directing "Ruthless People" (1986) and the successful film franchise, "The Naked Gun - From the Files of Police Squad!" (1988), which revitalized the Frank Drebin (Leslie Nielsen) character from "Police Squad" and spawned two hit sequels. From there, Zucker directed "BASEketball" (1998) and flew solo to direct the romantic comedy "My Boss' Daughter" (2003). On his own, Zucker breathed new life into the "Scary Movie" franchise, directing the third and fourth installments. Zucker remained, along with his two cohorts, a true pioneer of the spoof comedy. Another recent Zucker book, Before the Invention of Smiling: The Incredible Journey of the Zucker Family From Horse \& Buggy to Indoor Plumbing, delves into his family's history from Hungary to Milwaukee and Shorewood.

Robin Hemley has published fifteen books of fiction and nonfiction. His most recent books are the autofiction, Oblivion, An After-Autobiography (Gold Wake, 2022), The Art and Craft of Asian Stories: A Writer's Guide and Anthology, co-authored with Xu Xi (Bloomsbury, 2021) and Borderline Citizen: Dispatches from the Outskirts of Nationhood (Nebraska, 2020, Penguin SE Asia, 2021). He has previously published four collections of short stories, and his stories have been widely anthologized. His widely-used writing text, Turning Life into Fiction, has sold over a hundred thousand copies and has been in print for 25 years.

His work has been published and translated widely and he has received such awards as a Guggenheim Fellowship, a fellowship from the Rockefeller Foundation, three Pushcart Prizes in both nonfiction and fiction, The Nelson Algren Award for Fiction, The Independent Press Book Award for Memoir, among others. His short stories have been featured several times on NPR's "Selected Shorts" and his essays and short stories have appeared in such journals as Creative Nonfiction, Conjunctions, Guernica, The lowa Review, The New York Times, New York Magazine, Chicago Tribune, and many others. He is the Founder of the international nonfiction conference, NonfictioNOW and was the director of the Nonfiction Writing Program at The University of lowa for nine years, inaugural director of The Writers' Centre at YaleNUS, Singapore, and is a graduate of The lowa Writers' Workshop.

He is Inaugural Director of the Polk School of Communications at Long Island University-Brooklyn, Co-Director of the MFA in Creative Writing, Parsons Family Chair in Creative Writing, and University Professor. He has had artist residencies at The Bellagio Center at Lake Como, The Bogliasco Foundation, The Fine Arts Work Center in Provincetown, the MacDowell Colony, and others. He is co-editor with Leila Philip of Speculative Nonfiction and co-founder of Authors at Large with Xu Xi .

Several authors and exhibitors are on hand in the Don Taylor Writers Marketplace to discuss and sell their books. The Southeast Wisconsin Festival of Books has renamed its Authors Marketplace to memorialize support given by the late Don Taylor. Originally begun as a person-to-person contact for self-published authors to sell their books, the Marketplace evolved into an online marketplace where authors and organizations could contact the reading public through the Festival of Books website when the Festival went virtual in 2020. The Festival will continue this on-line presence this year and once again offer person-to-person sales.
Taylor was the primary sponsor of the Writers Marketplace since it began in 2014. "We thought this an appropriate recognition for someone who was so important to the success of the Festival," said Laraine O'Brien, Festival founder.
 A well-known banker and community leader, Taylor was also an author who had written several books of historical fiction set in Waukesha.
